Growing great talkers

Example: Create music using kitchen stuff*

Instructions for this activity can be found on the sfip.org.nz website in the Music category.

We talk everyday, but the way you talk to your child makes a big difference in how well they learn to talk. Talk with your child using more words and your child will learn more words and ideas. Here's an example of a 'Simple' conversation and a 'Great/Gifting' conversation. A 'Great/Gifting' conversation has more words and ideas to help your child learn.



A 'Simple' Conversation

- Adult: You want to play with my pots Okay. Make some music.
- Child: I want to hit and ...Mum, I want a pot...and another pot... This one.
- Adult: Okay... Um... Here... here's a pot. Don't drum too hard though. Make some music. Go on. Hit the pot... like this. (Mum hits the pot with her hand in

(Mum hits the pot with her hand in a beat).

- Child: I want a lid. This lid. I can hit it.
- Adult: No... try hitting the pot like I did. Look... Now, play by yourself. I'm busy making tea.
- Child: (Child finds a spoon on the table and starts hitting the pot with it.) This is a big spoon, isn't it? I'm going to use it to hit my pot.

Number of words spoken = 83 44 words by adult directly to child 39 words by child to adult

SIMPLER words used

pots • make some music drum too hard • try hitting • by yourself busy making tea • a big spoon

Fewer ideas on offer

- You can make music with a pot.
- Hit a pot with your hand to drum.
- Play by yourself.
- Mum is busy.
- You can use a spoon to hit a pot.

Talk with your child using more words.

More words gift more words. Your child's words will grow. More words gift more ideas. Your child's ideas will grow. Talk to your child using more words.

Encourage your child to talk by looking and listening.

Ask questions with your child to help them to think. Talk about your thinking too.

Explain what you are doing and what words mean.

Join in, laugh and play with your child. Children love fun.

Use more words. These are gifts, helping them to become great talkers.

Use new and different words. They can learn and use these too.

Give your child time to talk. Notice what they are saying and respond to their talk.

A 'Great/Gifting' Conversation

- Adult: I know... Let's open up this cupboard and you and I can take turns to choose something to be an instrument. Good idea? (Mum guides the child to open the cupboard, peers inside and chooses a pot.)
- Child: Yes... I want to choose... Yes... I choose and then you choose... Okay? (The child shows she understands the idea of taking turns and choosing.)
- Adult: Okay... Um... Here. I'll choose this very big pot we use for making soup. It's the one I made soup in on Monday. It could be a booming bass drum. I'll put it on the floor here. (Mum puts her very big pot down, directly looking at the child as she does this.) Your turn. I wonder what you can spy?
- Child: This one... This one on the floor. It's a lid. It's a lid for the pot. I can hit it. (Mum kneels down beside the child where she has the lid.)
- Adult: Ah... The lid could make a beautiful rhythm, couldn't it? What about if you choose a really big spoon from the cutlery drawer and you gently tap the lid like a band drum... (*Mum shows a stroking action*) Like Uncle Dan when he plays in the band. Remember how Uncle hits and strokes his drums. You could gently hit and stroke the lid like he does. He plays the ukulele too, doesn't he? What a clever musician he is! (*Mum gently taps a beating noise by stroking her fingers across the lid*.)
- Child: (Child goes to cutlery drawer which is now open.) This is a big spoon, isn't it? I'm going to use this with my lid.

Number of words spoken = 193

142 words by adult directly to child (gifting language) 51 words by child to adult

More ideas on offer

Pots come in various sizes.

- A spoon can be a musical stroking and hitting tool, used with a lid or pot.
- You can make soup in a pot.
- We make soup.
- Bass drums making a booming sound.
- We can make rhythm with kitchen things.
- Spoons are stored in the cutlery drawers.
- Gently stroking and hitting makes rhythm.
- Uncle Dan is band drummer
- Uncle plays drums and the ukulele
- A musician plays music and makes sound.
